

Hardy Annuals and Perennials for Winter Cover Crops and Spring Bloom

I have used the following flower varieties for twenty years to help me manage my five acre garden without mulch. I have suggested those that offer the best success and maximum cover for weed suppression. These plants help us pass through the first early weeds by suppressing them and give us a head start in spring. The summer selections keep down summer weeds. Some hand weeding will be necessary. With luck and little interference from humans, (little or no mulch) many of these will return the next year.

Sow Sept. 15 with irrigation. Nov.1 without. Or Sow Mar. 1. (Best for many.)

Do not till. Kill or remove weeds. Mix with granular fertilizer and scatter by hand or for more efficient spread use a hand seed spreader.

Red Corn Poppy:	Papaver rhoeas	Europe.	Mar. 1 in gravel. Poor soil.
Showy Primrose:	Oenothera speciosa	Native. S.E., U.S.	Mar. 1 Sept. Nov. Must have! Use in difficult areas.
Rocket Larkspur:	Delphinium ajacis	Europe.	Sept. Nov. Mar.
Tickseed:	Coriopsis lanceolata	Native. E. U.S.	Sept. Nov. Mar.

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Sew Aug. 15 with irrigation. Sept. 1. AND AGAIN for a new crop Mar. 15.
Do not till. Kill or remove weeds. Mix with granular fertilizer and or lime. Scatter by hand or for more efficient spread use a hand seed spreader.
